


OBSERVATION POSTS.

  D.—Tracks where observers have jumped into the trench just before reaching the sky line. These point to the observation post A' being the most used.









## PREPARATION AGAINST ATTACK.

AREA:—River Ancre to River Somme. La Bassée Canal to River Scarpe.




New lines of wire erected before the trench is dug. At A.A. trace of trench and traverses with dug-outs commenced. At B.B. traverses dug to mark course of new trench.

















LINKING UP SHELL HOLES.








TRENCH BEFORE AND AFTER CAPTURE.
